





कुत्तों को भी मिला मूल निवासी का अधिकार, भगाया नहीं जा सकता

पिछले दिनों कई स्थानों पर कुत्तों की अब्दरता के बाद इससे छुटकारा पाने की मांग तेज होने लगी है। लॉकिन पशु प्रेमियों के लिए अच्छी खबर यह है कि कुत्तों को भी मूल निवासी का अधिकार मिल गया है। कुत्तों को भगाया नहीं जा सकता। कुत्ता भले ही लोगों को काटा हो, उसे उसके मोहल्ले या गांव से विस्थापित नहीं किया जा सकता है। वह जहां चाहे रह सकता है या अपनी मर्जी से जा भी सकता है। सुप्रीम कोर्ट के निर्देश के अनुसार केंद्र सरकार ने पशु क्रूरता निवारण अधिनियम के तहत पशु (कुत्ता) जन्म नियंत्रण नियमावली को मंगलवार को अधिसूचित कर दिया है।

पशुओं पर अत्याचार रोकने के लिए देश में पहली बार 1960 में पशु क्रूरता निवारण अधिनियम लाया गया था। केंद्र सरकार ने इसी अधिनियम के तहत पशु (कुत्ता) जन्म नियंत्रण नियमावली-2023 को अधिसूचित किया है। नई नियमावली में स्पष्ट किया गया है कि उन क्षेत्रों में कुत्तों को खिलाने या आश्रय देने से भी

जहां मर्जी चाहे, वहां जा सकेंगे कुत्ते।

कोई मना नहीं कर सकता है, जहां ये कुत्ते रह रहे हैं। किसी क्षेत्र से कुत्तों को भगाए-हटाए बिन भी मनुष्यों एवं आवाश कुत्तों के बीच के संघर्षों से निपटने के उपाय तलाशे जा सकते हैं।

दरअसल, सुप्रीम कोर्ट ने अपने कई आदेशों में विशेष रूप से उल्लेख किया है कि कुत्तों को विस्थापित करने की में संशोधन किया गया था, जिसमें स्पष्ट किया गया था कि अगर कुत्ता खतरनाक है तो भी उसे मारा नहीं जा सकता।

रेवोज रोधी कार्यक्रम को संयुक्त रूप से चलाने चाहिए। भारतीय पशु कल्याण बोर्ड से मान्यता प्राप्त संस्थाओं को ही नसबंदी अधिवान चलाने की अनुमति देने चाहिए। ऐसे संगठनों की सूची बोर्ड की वेबसाइट पर डप्लेट कराई जाए और समय-समय पर अपडेट भी किया जाए। कुत्तों की नसबंदी के दौरान भी किसी प्रकार की क्रूरता नहीं होनी चाहिए।

नई नियमावली को अधिसूचित करने के साथ ही केंद्र सरकार ने सभी राज्यों के मुख्य सचिवों, पशुपालन विभाग एवं शहरी विकास विभाग के प्रधान सचिवों को पत्र जारी कर दिया है। स्थानीय निकायों से आग्रह किया गया है कि वे नियमों को अधिकार: क्रियान्वित करें। किसी भी संस्था को ऐसे कार्यक्रम चलाने की अनुमति न है तो जिसे भारतीय पशु कल्याण बोर्ड से मान्यता नहीं है और एक संस्था को रोकने के लिए डीएम ने 12 सिविल कोर्ट निर्देश जारी किया था। इसमें स्पष्ट तरीके का कानून के खिलाफ एक या आरबद्धपूर्व द्वारा जारी किया गया विधियां द्वारा रोकने के लिए नियम बनाए जाने पर उन्हें भी कर पद्धतिकरण के खिलाफ करने भी किया जा सकता है। डीएम ने कहा है कि बेसिन कुत्तों को खाना खिलाने वाले को रोकना या घमकाना आवश्यक है। डीएम के निर्देशनुसार, सभी संस्थाएँ कोर्ट एवं और आरबद्धपूर्व पालतू कुत्ते के खुए पर मजल लाने के लिए नियम नहीं बना सकती। यह प्रतिक्रिया को उत्तरी उपर्याके द्वारा दी गई थी कि एक पशु कल्याण समिति का नाम करना है। इसमें सेवाराज जनकर्मी के लिए काम करने वालों की शामिल किया गया था कि अगर कुत्ता खतरनाक है तो भी उसे मारा नहीं जा सकता।

redressal of their grievance through a process of dialogue and discussion through the Animal Welfare Committee failing which the said issue may be brought to the notice of the AWBI through the RWA. The AWBI shall ensure expeditious resolution of the issues.

150. The Government of India (Ministry of Personal, Public Grievances and Pensions, Department of Personal and Training) by Office Memorandum dated 26th May, 2006 notified that the Government servant who indulges in act of cruelty to animals will be making himself liable for action under Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act. Besides, punishment under the Act, he would also make himself liable for action under CCS(Conduct) Rules for conduct unbecoming of a Government servant. The said Office Memorandum also added that while residents and Associations are free to address institutional agencies for redressal of their grievances, no resident/association will interfere with the freedom of other residents in tending animals etc. AWBI shall bring this to the notice of RWA of Government employees.

151. Despite the clear position of law prohibiting cruelty to the animal including stray dogs, there is increasing tendency of the citizens to defy the same. Many times, the Government employees take up a position in complete violation of well settled law which has been dealt with in the Office Memorandum dated 26th May, 2006. Such act of defiance be noted down in the ACR file of Government employee. If any such complaint is received by AWBI, the same be sent to the concerned office for being placed in the ACR file of the Government employee for necessary action as per CCS Rules.

Conclusion

146. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the RWA or Municipal Corporation and all Government authorities including enforcement authorities like Police to provide all assistance and ensure that no hindrance is caused to the caregivers or feeders of community dogs. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the jurisdictional SHO to ensure that peace and harmony is maintained amongst the residents, care-givers and community dog feeders and there is no harassment to any care-giver or community dog feeder from feeding community dogs in the manner specified.

147. It is the duty and obligation of every Resident Welfare Association or Municipal Corporation (in case RWA is not available), to ensure that every community dog in every area has access to food and water in the absence of caregivers or community dog feeders in the said area.

148. AWBI shall ensure that every Resident Welfare Association or Municipal Corporation (in case RWA is not available), shall have an Animal Welfare Committee, which shall be responsible for ensuring compliance of the provisions of the PCA Act and ensure harmony and ease of communication between caregivers, feeders or animal lovers and other residents.

149. In case, any resident(s) or the RWA has any grievance with regard to any act of caregivers and feeders, in relation to feeding of community dogs, the said resident(s), shall, at the first instance seek

TO WHOMSOEVER IT MAY CONCERN

Animal Welfare Board of India, a statutory body was constituted under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animal Act, 1960, an act of Parliament in order to promote of animal welfare generally and for protecting animals from being subjected to unnecessary pain or suffering. AWBI has been implementing various animal welfare schemes and enacting and implementing various acts and rules framed under Prevention of Cruelty to Animal Act, 1960.

As you are aware that Govt. of India Notified the Animal Birth Control (Dogs) Rules, 2001, under the PCA Act, 1960 vide the Gazette of India: Extra Ordinary Part II – Sec. 3 – sub. II dated 24th Dec. 2001 to implement sterilization and vaccination of stray / community dogs to control the dog population.

As per the Department of Personnel & Training, Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions, New Delhi letter no.F.No.30/9/2006-WELFARE dated 26.5.2006, it is informed that "if any Govt. Servant indulges in act of cruelty to animals he will be making himself liable for action under Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act. Besides, punishment under the Act, he would also make himself liable for action under CCS (Conduct) Rules for conduct unbecoming of a Govt. Servant.

It may be noted that for dealing with the problem of stray animals, there are designated agencies in Govt./local self-government organizations etc. Such Organisations regularly undertake inoculations, sterilization of female animals etc. Recognised Associations in Govt. colonies may approach such Institutions for redressal of their grievances.

All the problems of stray animals have to be handled within the institutional framework available and no association, recognized or unrecognized, shall take recourse to action on their own, either themselves or through any person employed by them like security guards etc.

Therefore, you are directed not to remove the community dogs from the any place as it is illegal and violation of above said rules. This amounts to cruelty to animals as per PCA Act and is a punishable offence. However, it is suggested that you may take help of recognized NGOs (List of AWO's in your state is available in the website www.awbi.org) conducting ABC Programme for taking up Sterilization and immunization of stray dogs in the place to manage their population and to implement the provisions of Animal Birth Control (Dogs) Rules, 2001 in letter and spirit.

You are requested to issue proper instructions to the concerned authority in this regard.

YAMUNA FLOODS – DELHI/NCR

Animals remain stuck – 13th July, 2023

For three days, NGOs, animal shelters and volunteers were working round the clock to save not just dogs, but cows, buffaloes, camels and horses along the floodplains of the Yamuna.

This was the first time ever that volunteers across Delhi/NCR joined hands to help the animals stranded in Delhi floods with flood level at 208.66 meters (Highest Flood level) since 1978.

The minute the boat reached land, the dogs and puppies ran for the food. Traumatized by the floods, a few whimpered and yelped.

But not all rescue efforts have been successful. As shelters started flooding, many animals could not be rescued in time and as a result many lives were being lost

Rescuing cows and buffaloes is nothing short of an uphill task. Putting them on a boat is near impossible, so volunteers must help them swim to the shore.

When displaced families pleaded with activists and NDRF personnel to rescue their cattle and belongings, they were told that help was reserved for 'living beings.'

Volunteers at the site were seen pleading with NDRF boatmen to accompany them to the flooded area near the Delhi-Noida Direct Flyway, where many animals, including horses, were reportedly stranded. But humans came first.

ADOPT, DON'T SHOP.



- 1. You will save a life** - When you adopt a pet from a shelter, you'll give that animal a second chance at life
- 2. You'll save money and receive a healthy animal** - Animals that have been placed in shelters are usually spayed or neutered, as well as vaccinated. These initial procedures can be costly. It's also relatively inexpensive to adopt a pet from a shelter in comparison to purchasing dogs or cats from pet stores.

"During the lockdown, I saw some stray dogs sitting out on the road, probably wondering where all the humans were. My first thought was that the dogs are hungry. So, I asked my mom to cook something for them and that's how my journey started. We are making each and every effort to successfully feed 200 and more stray animals during the lockdown. I never thought my one small initiative of feeding 5 dogs would make me register a trust, Touch And Treat for the Stray Animals and their Betterment."

Cosmo: How have you and your organization helped these animals?

Anupam Mehta: Over the last year, we have vaccinated over a hundred puppies, sterilized a large number of stray animals, and helped with various rescue and treatment cases - maggot wounds, skin infections and leg wounds. Apart from this, we have set up dog houses, winter jute beds and blankets for the stray animals across Delhi/NCR. Our team of volunteers have been feeding over 200 animals during the lockdown.

This summer we have also started our campaign The Water Bowl Project by placing earthen bowls filled with water for animals and birds. We aim to place 250 bowls this summer. We have also successfully served 1 lakh plus food meals over the span of a year across Delhi/NCR. Our team of volunteers take this very seriously and have done a great job so far!

NEW DELHI: Animal rescue across the nation saw a spike in adoptions and encourage applications towards the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic. Notwithstanding, attempting to proceed with animal rescue efforts and adoptions has progressively become difficult in the wake of social distancing limitations.

Antibodies and insignificant vet visits have been limited and that compromises salvage activities and the creatures they are attempting to save. "Saving one stray dog will not change the world, but surely for that one dog, the world will change forever," said Anupam.

Anupam one day did three hours of digging to bring out three puppies alive and one dead puppy who were trapped inside a tunnel at an MCD ground in Lajpat Nagar, Delhi, with his friend Neha Thukral. He looks after the vaccination and other medical expenses of the strays.

According to Anupam, dogs are one of the most loved species of animals. He added, "We tend to ignore those abandoned or born on the roads. What I am doing is not some sort of pro-social behaviour but just a humane gesture. Let us all work together to not just help the dogs but all animals." Anupam also claims to have played an integral role in advocating the 'Adopt don't shop' voice.



Common Crimes: A Grim Picture

"The most common violent attacks against animals in our country are beating, kicking, and torturing them," says Anupam Mehta. "These are followed by their confinement and maiming. What Drives People To Harm Dogs?

Delving into the reasons behind animal cruelty, Anupam Mehta highlights a few key factors. "People with mental health disorders, substance abuse, lack of empathy, childhood abuse, and trauma, as well as inadequate socialisation, are more likely to abuse animals," he explains. These deeper, often overlooked issues contribute to the widespread mistreatment of dogs.

Ineffective Laws: The Need For Change

Anupam Mehta doesn't mince words when it comes to the effectiveness of India's legal framework. "*Legal regulations in India have not been very effective at deterring animal abuse,"* he states. "*There is a need for more stringent laws and enforcement. The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act has not been revised since 1960. The culprits can easily get away with killing, maiming, or beating a stray animal for a fine of merely fifty rupees."*"

He compares India's laws to those in other countries, emphasising the need for change. "*In almost all progressive countries, there are laws to save the animals from the infliction of unnecessary pain and suffering, or in other words, to prevent man from behaving cruelly to animals. Hence, there is an utmost need to revise the laws and regulations in our country to reduce crime and graph."*"



A Call To Action: What Can We Do?

Despite the grim reality, Anupam Mehta believes the community can play a pivotal role in reducing crimes against dogs. "*By conducting and organising spay and neuter drives around our community areas to prevent birth control and from multiplying in numbers, we can make a difference,"* he suggests. "*Vaccinate all of them to keep them rabies-free, which will in turn result in a smaller number of animal cruelty cases."*"

Anupam Mehta urges individuals to take responsibility: "*Do your best to raise awareness about animal cruelty cases within your community and report them to NGOs if you see one. Adopting a dog means one life less on the streets and would prevent such crimes. Create safe shelters for them in your community areas so that they have a space to live and both humans and animals can coexist in peace."*"

Following several instances of fatal attacks, the Centre has sought a ban on the import, breeding and sale of "ferocious" dog breeds such as pitbull, rottweiler, terrier, wolf dog and mastiff as pet dogs, deeming them "dangerous for human life". The restrictions will also extend to mixed and cross-bred canines. Existing house pets of these breeds are to be sterilised.

"We applaud this step to safeguard vulnerable dog breeds exploited by criminal elements of society for illegal dogfighting, as well as children and elderly citizens who are wounded and even killed by specific breeds that are trained to consider other living beings' prey," says Haurya Agarwal, advocacy research associate, PETA, adding that the order will help address the misuse of

these animals as weapons, as well as their high abandonment rate in India. But not everyone is convinced. "There is no such thing as an aggressive breed," notes Ambika Shukla, animal rights activist and a trustee of People for Animals (PFA).
